BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE: Kenneth Merrill Lynch was born November 27, 1887 in Hamilton County, Texas. He attended the University of Texas where he earned his M.D. in 1910. He then moved to Philadelphia to attend graduate school and become a resident pathologist at Philadelphia General Hospital from 1910-1911. Lynch also earned honorary degrees from the University of South Carolina, Clemson University, and the College of Charleston.

Post Philadelphia General, Lynch became an instructor in pathology at the University of Pennsylvania from 1911-1913; during that time he was also an assistant pathologist at Philadelphia General Hospital and the University of Pennsylvania Hospital. In 1913, Lynch moved to Charleston, South Carolina to become a professor of pathology at the Medical College of South Carolina from 1913-1921 and 1926-1960; only taking a break to have a private practice in Dallas, Texas. In 1918, contributing to the war effort, Lynch was a captain in the Medical Corps of the United States Army. After his return to the Medical College, Lynch was named vice-dean in 1935 and held that position until 1943 when he was named dean. In 1949 Lynch added the title of president of the Medical College of South Carolina to the title of dean until 1960 when he was named chancellor. During his years, after his return to Charleston, Lynch was a consulting pathologist for the hospitals of the area from 1926-1960.

Throughout his lifetime Lynch accumulated a lengthy list of accomplishments. Lynch served as the secretary of the Medical Education Section of the Southern Medical Association in 1920 and from 1928-1931; a councilor of the Southern Medical Association from 1935-1940; the vice president of the American Medical Association

from 1935-1936; the President of the American Society of Tropical Medicine 1930-1931; the president of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists from 1930-1931; the president of the South Carolina Medical Association from 1930-1931. Lynch was awarded the Gold Medal from the American Medical Association in 1921, the Research Medal from the Southern Medical Association in 1920, the Distinguished Service Award of the Southern Medical Association in 1957, the Distinguished Service Citation and Medal for Distinguished Service to Medicine from the University of Texas in 1967. Lynch also received the honor of being named american editor of *Green's Manual of Pathology*, published in England and the United States, and was an editor for the *American Journal of Tropical Medicine*, *American Journal of Clinical Pathology*, and *Journal of Digestive Diseases and Nutrition*. Lynch was also awarded the Sesquicentennial Distinguished Faculty Award a short time before his death in 1974.

Lynch was actively conducting research until his retirement and published over one hundred and twenty papers and wrote or co-authored six books. In Lynch's own opinion, his research breaks down into three major accomplishments: his being 'credited with the first in vitro culturing of a parasite flagellate, *Trichomonas hominis*,' his acknowledgement of the increase of *Granuloma Inguinale* cases in the United States and the helping to control that disease, and his being on the forefront of industrial dust diseases research; particularly asbestos. Researchers interested in his scientific research should also consult MSS 982, the Kenneth M. Lynch Papers.

In 1944, Lynch, now with the title of president of the Medical College of South Carolina, devised a plan to expand the college to incorporate the ideas of medical education, research, and community medical service. This expansion not only expanded the grounds of the campus, but also incorporated an increase in faculty for the medical, pharmacy, and nursing education departments to accommodate the increase in student enrollment; dormitories to house those students were also built. The plan also established a dentistry department and graduate school program; enacted in 1953. Lynch also pushed for a reform in the education of those working with medical technology. Lynch died at his home in Summerville the morning of November 29th, 1974 only two days after his eighty-seventh birthday.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE: The Kenneth M. Lynch Presidential Records, 1913-1983, 21 cubic feet, document Dr. Lynch's activities as dean of the College of Medicine (1943-1949), president of the Medical College of South Carolina (MCSC) (1950-1960), and chancellor (1960-1974). Records pertain to the administration of the Medical College and Medical College Hospital. The collection has been arranged into four sub-groups: (1) Dean, College of Medicine Records, (2) Presidential Records, (3) Chancellor Records, and (4) Expansion Program. [n.b. Sub-group divisions are not absolute. Researchers need to be aware that dates and subjects overlap between sub-groups. Please see box list for cross-references]. Each sub-group is further arranged by series and then by sub-series.

The **DEAN SUB-GROUP**, 1935-1950, 0.5 cubic feet, contains documents concerning Lynch's tenure as dean of the College of Medicine. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, policies and procedures, presentations, announcements, publications, reports, minutes, surveys, notes, and newspaper clippings. Topics include the collaborative relationship between the Medical College and Roper Hospital, the Medical College incorporation of Roper's Out-Patient Clinic, the use of private patients in student teaching, faculty teaching schedules, and the establishment of memorial funds. The sub-group also contains materials concerning the education of veterans post-World War II, and correspondence with Herman B. Baruch regarding Baruch Auditorium. Folders are arranged alphabetically by subject and then folder title.

The **PRESIDENT SUB-GROUP**, 1930-1964, 8.5 cubic feet, pertains to Lynch's tenure as president of the Medical College of South Carolina, however it also contains materials from Lynch's early position as professor of pathology, dean of the College of Medicine, as well as some records from his chancellorship. The records consist of correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, reports, newspaper clippings, minutes and agendas, photographs, biographies, budgets, rules and regulations, manuals, personnel files, and notes documenting the administration of the Medical College and the Medical College Hospital. The sub-group is arranged into series and then alphabetically by sub-series.

The <u>Administrative Correspondence Series</u>, 1943-1960, 3 file folders, contains Lynch's incoming and outgoing correspondence with MCSC faculty and staff, South Carolina state legislators, and State Board of Health staff. In addition, the series contains Lynch's correspondence with the University of South Carolina's coaching staff regarding physical exams. Topics include the establishment of a bookstore, annual reviews, the establishment of a dental school, salaries, funding and expenses, course and program development, as well as speaking invitations. The series is arranged chronologically.

The <u>Administrative Files Series</u>, 1913-1965, 8 cubic feet, contains records documenting the general oversight and administration of the MCSC, its colleges, and the Medical College Hospital. The files include materials documenting personnel issues, financial resources, and Lynch's involvement in professional organizations and Charleston-area hospitals. The series is arranged alphabetically into twenty-one subseries.

The **Academic Affairs Sub-Series**, 1944-1959, 2 file folders, contains correspondence and memoranda concerning curriculum planning and postgraduate courses. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Academic Departments Sub-Series**, 1933-1960, 0.5 cubic feet, contains files on the activities of the various departments of MCSC and the Medical College Hospital. These files include correspondence and memoranda on faculty appointments, requests for equipment, grant information, policies and procedures, department statistics, and productivity reports. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Accreditation Sub-Series**, 1949-1957, 4 file folders, concerning MCSC's accreditation, including surveys of programs and inspections. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, and reports. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Alumni Sub-Series**, 1931-1960, 0.25 cubic feet, contains correspondence, memoranda, newsletters, lists, and reports concerning MCSC alumni. Topics include fundraising for the Alumni House/Dormitory, interactions with national alumni organizations, and alumni activities. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Board of Trustees Sub-Series**, 1944-1960, <0.25 cubic feet, contains meeting agendas, minutes, and supplementary materials such as correspondence, memoranda, and reports used in preparation for board meetings. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Cancer Clinic Sub-Series**, 1946-1960, <0.25 cubic feet, concerns the establishment of a cancer clinic at MCSC. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, meeting minutes and agendas, and financial reports. The sub-series also concerns personnel appointments including director of the Cancer Clinic, and Lynch's interactions with state legislatures to garner support for the clinic. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Clinics**, **MCSC Sub-Series**, 1947-1961, 4 folders, concerns the clinical organization and reorganization of the MCSC Heart Clinic, the Maternal Welfare Clinic, and the Mental Hygiene Clinic. Topics pertain to the establishment, funding, and administration of the clinics. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, and newspaper clippings. The Sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Colleges Sub-Series**, 1918-1965, 0.25 cubic feet, concerns the administration and activities of the School of Medicine, the School of Nursing, the School of Pharmacy, and the establishment of the graduate school and the dental school. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, surveys, reports, legislation, notes, and newspaper clippings. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Committees Sub-Series**, 1943-1961, <0.25 cubic feet, documents the activities of various MCSC and Medical College Hospital committees. Topics include committee membership, curriculum development, particularly the U.S. Department of Defense's Medical Education on National Defense (MEND) Program, animals in research, and program funding. Record types include minutes and agendas, correspondence, memoranda, annual reports, and publications. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Education Sub-Series**, 1944-1953, <0.25 cubic feet, concerns the state legislature's study on consolidating higher education programs, the establishment of the Council of Higher Education, MCSC's implementation of the Graduate Record Exam (GRE), as well as the medical education of African-Americans. Record types include

correspondence, memoranda, reports, bills, publications, and surveys. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Facilities & Physical Plant Sub-Series**, 1951-1957, 2 folders, concerns the MCSC's agreement with the College of Charleston on the use of, and access to, the Fort Johnson property, and maintenance and renovations of Baruch Auditorium. Record types include plats, deeds, correspondence, memoranda, and renovation/restoration estimates for Baruch Auditorium. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically. For additional materials on the growth of MCSC, see the Expansion Program Sub-Group [below].

The **Finance Sub-Series**, 1943-1960, 0.25 cubic feet documents the financial management of MCSC, its departments and staff. Included is information collected regarding salaries and budgets for other medical schools, as well as state appropriations to MCSC. Record types include audit reports, correspondence, memoranda, financial statements concerning departmental budgets and income from professional fees, minutes, and budget reports. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Government Sub-Series**, 1913-1960, 0.25 cubic feet, documents Lynch's interactions with state and federal legislators concerning the administration of the MCSC and Medical College Hospital. Topics include state appropriations and MCSC budgets, the implementation of Medicare and state health programs, the admission of indigent patients, and employee benefits. In addition, the sub-series contains Lynch's correspondence with governors regarding MCSC programs and activities, and requests for information. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, surveys, statistics, and typescript copies of MCSC charters. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Hospital Administration Sub-Series**, 1958-1960, <0.25 cubic feet, pertains to the administration and management of the Medical College Hospital and its departments. Specific topics addressed include the cost of caring for Charleston County sponsored patients, disposition of the House Staff Loan Fund, and the establishment of a public relations office. In addition, the sub-series contains internal and external requests for information about the hospital, as well as materials documenting the agreement between MCSC, the Medical Society of South Carolina and the Charleston County Council regarding the administration of and responsibility for a community hospital. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, budget reports, and proposals and agreements. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Miscellaneous Sub-Series**, 1944-1960, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of correspondence, memoranda, policies and procedures, invoices, speeches, schedules, newspaper articles and clippings, and personnel files pertaining to a variety of subjects. Of note is Lynch's correspondence with Margot Freudenberg regarding the Physical Therapy Act and the role of physical therapy in health care, and Lynch's reference file on segregation and integration. Topics include faculty private practices, the service of

physicians in the armed forces, the education of veterans, and the establishment of memorials. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Personnel Sub-Series**, 1930-1962, 0.50 cubic feet, consists of Lynch's personnel files on faculty and staff. Topics concern faculty issues such as salaries, endowed professorships, consultation and reference practices, and appointments. In addition, the sub-series includes minutes and agendas from faculty meetings and files for some individual faculty members. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, policies and procedures, notes, and financial information. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Professional Groups Sub-Series**, 1935-1961, 0.5 cubic feet, contains files on Lynch's involvement with national and state professional organizations such as the American Medical Association and the Association of American Medical Colleges. Much of the information consists of requests for information, as well as statistics collected about the Medical College for use in professional surveys and accreditation applications. Records types include correspondence, memoranda, surveys, reports, membership applications, and negatives. The series is arranged alphabetically by organization name and then folder title. See also the Accreditation Sub-Series [above].

The **Publications Sub-Series**, circa 1940-1960, 2 cubic feet, consists of newspapers clippings collected by Lynch. The clippings concern the Medical College of South Carolina, the Medical College Hospital, its departments, programs, and research, as well as construction projects and development. The sub-series is unprocessed.

The **Reports Sub-Series**, 1948-1958, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of Lynch's reference copies of college and departmental annual reports. Record types include reports, correspondence, memoranda, and distribution lists. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically and then chronologically.

The **Research Sub-Series**, 1946-1959, 1 cubic foot, pertains to the administration and management of federally and organizationally-funded (i.e., American Cancer Society) research projects, teaching projects, research fellowships, and grant-funded programs. Files contain grant applications, funding information, progress reports to funding agencies, status reports to Lynch from Medical College departments conducting research, correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, press releases, reprints. In addition, the files document Lynch's own cancer research. For additional records pertaining to Lynch's personal research, see also MSS 982. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Student Affairs Sub-Series**, 1942-1960, 0.25 cubic feet, concerns scholarship opportunities, admissions requirements, extracurricular activities, and programs for students. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, and student surveys of courses. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The <u>Resource Files Series</u>, 1944-1958, 0.5 cubic feet, contains records used by Lynch for reference in the administration of the Medical College, the Medical College Hospital, and its contractual relationships with other area hospitals, including Roper Hospital, Baker Hospital, Pinehaven, and McClennan-Banks Hospital. These reference materials include agreements and contracts, planning and development files, reports prepared for Lynch, and materials the exploration of the establishment of a Community Hospital. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, and reports. The sub-series is arranged alphabetically.

The CHANCELLOR SUB-GROUP, 1931-1978, 3 cubic feet, contains documents collected and produced by Lynch during tenure as chancellor of the Medical College of South Carolina but also contains materials from his time as a professor of pathology, dean of the College of Medicine, and president. The records were used by Lynch for reference purposes and kept him abreast of Medical College activities. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, reports, surveys, pamphlets, policies and procedures, minutes and agendas, reprints, and newspaper clippings. The materials document Lynch's advisory role to his successors as president and to the Board of Trustees, as well as his general continued involvement with Medical College concerns. The sub-group also documents Lynch's involvement with professional medical associations, state health committees, and Charleston-area hospitals. Topics concern the administration and management of the Medical College and the Medical College Hospital. The sub-group is arranged into sixteen series and then alphabetically into subseries.

The **Board of Trustees Series**, 1954-1973, 0.25 cubic feet, contains meeting agendas, minutes, and supplementary materials such as correspondence, memoranda, newspaper clippings, charters and bylaws, and reports received by Lynch. The series includes Lynch's correspondence with board members regarding his opinions about administrative and managerial issues concerning the Medical College, as well as Lynch's retirement and his responsibilities as chancellor. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Colleges Series**, 1960-1971, <0.25 cubic feet, contains correspondence and memoranda between Lynch and the deans of the Colleges of Medicine and Nursing, as well as files on the development of the School of Graduate Studies. Additional record types include annual reports, newsletters, newspaper clippings, and notes kept by Lynch for reference purposes. Topics concern the establishment of memorials, the conferring of honorary degrees, faculty appointments, the hiring of deans, and general administrative concerns. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Committees Series**, 1960-1971, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of meeting agendas, minutes, and supplementary materials received by Lynch from the Hospital Staff Executive Committee. The series also contains correspondence, memoranda, and newspaper clippings. Committee meetings concerned issues such as parking, staffing, and hospital admissions. The series is arranged chronologically.

The **Correspondence Series**, 1931-1972, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of Lynch's internal and external correspondence with state officials, the leaders of other state colleges and universities, and Charleston-area hospital administrators. Topics include administrative issues at other hospitals, including the Veterans Administration, and the Medical College's teaching contract with the Veterans Administration. Correspondence also concerns the purchase of Riverside Geriatric and Convalescence Center by the Medical College, discrimination issues, and the Baruch family's continued support of the institution. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Departments Series**, 191949-1974, <0.25 cubic feet, documents the activities and programs of Medical College departments. Specifically, files pertain to departmental research programs, staffing and faculty issues, professional fees, as well as the establishment of the Storm Eye Institute. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, manuscripts, minutes, statistics, notes, and newspaper clippings maintained by Lynch in his reference files. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Education Series**, 1952-1972, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of correspondence, memoranda, newsletters, newspaper clippings, articles, reprints, press releases, and reports on educational concerns at the Medical College and the state of South Carolina. Specific topics include a second medical school at the University of South Carolina, the establishment of the South Carolina Council of Higher Education, and the consortium of Charleston-area hospitals and colleges. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Finance Series**, 1959-1963, 3 folders, pertains to the fiscal operation of the Medical College Hospital, including state appropriations, professional fees, income, expenditures, and departmental budgets. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, and newspaper clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Government Series**, 1943-1970, 0.25 cubic feet, is organized into two subseries, (1) Federal and (2) State & Local. Both sub-series consist of correspondence, memoranda, annual reports, articles, legislation, announcements, press releases, and newspaper clippings regarding government healthcare related issues. Lynch's correspondence with federal, state and local governmental officials concern topics such as state health initiatives, plans and programs, employee benefits, community hospital problems, and insurance coverage plans. The series and sub-series are both arranged alphabetically.

The **History Series**, 1965-1978, <0.25 cubic feet, pertains to Lynch's research into the history of the Medical College of South Carolina. Records collected were used by Lynch to prepare for his book in honor of the Medical College's sesquicentennial celebration in 1974. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, research notes, photographs, speeches, reports, and newspaper clippings and articles about MCSC history. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Hospitals Series**, 1944-1972, 0.25 cubic feet, documents activities at Charleston-area hospitals, as well as the Medical College's involvement. Topics include

the construction of the Veterans Administration Hospital and the Charleston County Hospital, the expansion of Pinehaven Hospital, staffing of hospitals, admissions issues, and contract negotiations. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, construction drawings and plans, surveys, statistics, photographs, reports, newspaper clippings, and meeting minutes. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Miscellaneous Series**, 1948-1983, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of correspondence, memoranda, reports, photographs, statistics, newsletters, and newspaper clippings collected by Lynch. Topics concern his retirement and his position as chancellor, bequests, and grievance procedures. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Personnel Series**, 1958-1973, 0.25 cubic feet, consists of Lynch's personal reference files on faculty and staff. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, contracts, reports on faculty revenue and expenses, meeting minutes and agendas, notes, statistics, and newspaper clippings regarding the Faculty Compensation Plan. This series includes Lynch's correspondence with Medical College administration about the plan. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Professional Groups Series**, 1935-1973, 0.25 cubic feet, documents Lynch's involvement in and interactions with state and national medical societies, including the American Medical Association, the American Association of Medical Colleges, and the South Carolina Medical Association. Topics include surveys and inspections of the Medical College conducted by the AMA and the AAMC. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, newsletters, newspaper clippings, and speeches. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Reports Series**, 1961-1962, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of reports, and Lynch's response to reports, concerning the organization and management of the Medical College. Records types include correspondence, memoranda, and newspaper clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Research Series**, 1959-1970, 0.25 cubic feet, contains correspondence, memoranda, progress reports, grant applications, newspaper clippings, and lists of Medical College grant-funded research projects kept by Lynch for his reference files. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **EXPANSION PROGRAM SUB-GROUP**, 1943-1966, 8.5 cubic feet, documents the development and implementation of Lynch's expansion program for the Medical College, its facilities and programs, from inception to completion. The records detail the construction of the Medical College Hospital, the College of Nursing building, and the Alumni House/Dormitory, and the establishment of the College of Dental Medicine. Additional topics include funding of the projects, staffing, equipment for and furnishing the new facilities. The files also detail state and federal involvement participation in the program. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, minutes and agendas, reports, policies and procedures, surveys, building plans, contracts, personnel records, financial files, newspaper clippings, and photographs. The sub-group is

arranged into thirty-three series according to Lynch's original file plan, consisting of series and sub-series, with some additional series added by the processing archivist for clarity and cohesion.

The **Accreditation Series**, 1956-1961, 1 folder, concerns accreditation of the Medical College Hospital by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Hospitals. Additional topics include the relationship between MCH and Roper Hospital. Record types include correspondence, articles, and newspaper clippings.

The **Alumni Series**, 1951, 1 folder, consists of a typescript copy of a presentation given by Lynch on May 16, 1951, to the MCSC Alumni Association. The speech concerned the status of the expansion program.

The **Building Series**, 1944-1968, 2.75 cubic feet, concerns the construction of new buildings and laboratory spaces, including MCH, the Alumni House/Dormitory, and the Library & Administration Building. Records types include correspondence, memoranda, meeting agendas, minutes, contracts, financial reports and budgets, permits, photographs, progress reports, newspaper clippings and articles, and drawings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Correspondence – Intramural Series**, 1947, 1 folder, consists of a letter to and from Lynch regarding newspaper coverage of the expansion program.

The **Correspondence – Local Series**, 1944-19155, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of incoming and outgoing correspondence concerning the implementation of the expansion program, its impact on the community, and MCSC's relationship with Roper Hospital. Additional record types include memoranda, meeting agenda and minutes, presentation, and newspaper articles. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The Correspondence – State and Alumni Series, 1943-1959, 0.25 cubic feet, consists of incoming and outgoing correspondence between Lynch, South Carolina state legislators and governors, and MCSC alumni. Topics include the development and implementation of the expansion program, funding, and support for or against the program. Record types include memoranda, newspaper clippings and articles, meeting minutes, legislative acts and bills, and statistics. The series is arranged alphabetically by branch of state government, and then alphabetically by correspondent.

The Correspondence – National Series, 1944-1954, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of Lynch's incoming and outgoing correspondence with members of the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate regarding funding of, and support for, the expansion program. Additional record types include memoranda, surveys, reports, and newspaper clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically by correspondent.

The **Dedication Series**, 1945-1955, <0.25 cubic feet, concerns the planning of dedication ceremonies for the MCH, Alumni House/Dormitory, and Clinic-Lab Building. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, invitations, programs, newspaper

articles and clippings, press releases, and photographs. The series is arranged alphabetically by building.

The **Dentistry, School of Series**, 1953-1973, 3 folders, pertains to the establishment of the School of Dentistry, including legislative support, search for deans, and admissions. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, and newspaper clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Development Series**, 1944-1966, <0.25 cubic feet, consists of correspondence, memoranda, reports, surveys, and newspaper clippings concerning the physical and programmatic expansion of MCSC. Records pertain to the establishment of a cancer clinic, arthritis center, and training programs. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Finance Series**, 1943-1963, 0.75 cubic feet, concerns federal and state financing to construct the Medical College Hospital, dormitories, plant additions, and other improvements, as well as increasing class sizes. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, surveys, drawings, plans, budgets, applications, meeting minutes and agendas, notes, newspaper articles and clippings, and legislative acts and bills. The series is arranged into federal and state, and then alphabetically.

The **Grounds Series**, 1954-1960, 2 folders, concerns landscaping improvements around new construction, and the addition of a swimming pool to the dormitory. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, notes, plans, and budgets. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Housing Series**, 1956-1960, 3 folders, pertains to the construction of housing for faculty and students, as well as the Phi Chi Fraternity building. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, notes, and reports. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Land Series**, 1945-1966, 0.25 cubic feet, documents MCSC's purchase of property from Porter Military Academy, Pinehaven Hospital, and South Carolina Electric & Gas Company on which to build MCH, Nursing building, and the dormitories. Topics also include site clearance. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, contracts, agreements, notes, budgets, and newspaper articles and clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Lantern Slides Series**, 1954, 1974, 1 folder, contains an inventory list of lantern slides depicting construction activity on campus.

The **Legal Counsel Series**, 1955-1958, 1 folder, consists of correspondence between Lynch and attorneys at Sinkler, Gibbs, and Simons regarding payments, contracts, and legal counsel.

The **Legislation Series**, 1945-1960, <0.25 cubic feet, concerns interactions with state legislators. Topics include funding and accreditation. Record types include

correspondence, memoranda, reports, surveys, financial records, and newspaper clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **License Series**, 1955-1960, 1 folder, concerns the State Board of Health's inspection of, and licensing of, the Medical College Hospital for occupancy. Record types include correspondence and memoranda.

The **Memberships Series**, 1953, 2 folders, concerns MCSC's memberships, as well as its involvement, in the American Hospital Association and the South Carolina Hospital Association. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, and applications. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Nursing, School of Series**, 1949-1958, 0.25 cubic feet, concerns the planning and construction of the nursing building. Topics include construction costs, financing, insurance, furnishing and decorating, and site clearance. Records types include correspondence, memoranda, contracts, programs, meeting minutes and agendas, plans, photographs, reports, and newspaper articles and clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Operation – Dormitory Series**, 1954-1956, <0.25 cubic feet, pertains to the administration and management of the nursing building including staffing, policies and procedures, students, and admissions. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, reports, meeting agendas and minutes, and newspaper clippings. The series is arranged chronologically and then alphabetically.

The **Operation – Hospital Series**, 1950-1965, 1.5 cubic feet, documents the management of MCH central administration, as well as other hospital laboratory and departmental services. Topics include admissions, patient care, personnel, staff policies and procedures, professional fees, safety, facilities maintenance, and financing. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, manuals, meeting minutes and agendas, statistics, reports, and newspaper articles and clippings. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Organization – Hospital Series**, 1945-1958, 4 folders, concerns the administrative organization and management of MCH and its clinics and departments. Record types include correspondence, memoranda, policies and procedures, manuals, and surveys. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Pictures Series**, circa 1954-1960, 1 cubic foot, contains photographs taken of the property that the MCH, College of Nursing Building, and Alumni House were built. The images show the properties before demolition of residences, the progress of construction projects, and the completed facilities. The series is unprocessed.

The **Plans and Organization Series**, 1944-1955, documents the planning stages of the expansion program and includes copies of the 1944 master plan, as well as its 1953 updates, and correspondence with administrators of other medical schools about their

expansion programs. Record types also include correspondence, memoranda, reports, publications, and reprints. Of significant note is the statement presented by Medical College faculty to the Board of Trustees on January 3, 1946, concerning published opposition to the expansion program. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Medical Center Planning Series**, 1956-1958, 1 folder, concerns planning for growth around the MCSC campus. Includes a report on preliminary growth by the Charleston County Planning Board, 1957. Other record types include minutes, agendas, memoranda, and correspondence.

The **Positions** – **New Medical College Hospital Series**, 1948-1957, 3 folders, consists of correspondence, memoranda, position descriptions, applications, employment contracts, CVs, and photographs. Topics concern employment opportunities at the Medical College Hospital, specifically administrative positions. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Publicity Series**, 1944-1960, <0.25 cubic feet, contains newspaper articles and clippings, newsletters, reports, correspondence, memoranda, reprints, as well as the MCH dedication program documenting the expansion program and the construction of the Medical College Hospital. Of special note is a special edition of the MCSSC *Bulletin*, "Special Bulletin on Expansion Program" published January 1945. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Public Relations Series**, 1955-1956, 2 folders, consists of correspondence, memoranda, newspaper clippings, and invitations regarding a tour of the MCH by state newspaper editors, as well as brochures from other health centers. The series is arranged alphabetically.

The **Statistics Series**, 1939-1958, 3 folders, contains reports, surveys, and charts concerning medical education in the United States. Topics include class size, enrollment, operational expenses, patient admissions, salaries, and faculty. Of special note is a copy of the report, *Medicine in South Carolina*, by Dr. A. M. Lassek. The series is arrange alphabetically.

The **Superintendent Series**, 1955-1966, 2 folders, contains correspondence and memoranda between Lynch and Glenn D. Searcy, MCH Superintendent, and Burt H. Moore, Assistant Superintendent. Topics concern administrative issues such as staffing, parking, supplies, maintenance, and hospital policies and procedures. The series is arranged chronologically.

The **Telephone Series**, 1955, 1 folder, contains telephone directories for MCH, as well as correspondence regarding updating telephone numbers.

The Miscellaneous Materials Re Expansion Program, 1944- Series, 1944- 1963, 0.5 cubic feet, consists of miscellaneous correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, reports, surveys, reprints, newspaper clippings, publications, and statements concerning

the expansion program. Topics include MCH accreditation, MCSC responses to newspaper articles, policies and procedures, and the education of military veterans. Of special note are copies of the pamphlet, *A Survey of the Medical College Expansion Program and Its Factual Background* by Drs. Lynch, Boone, Smith, Kelley, Cain, Kredel, and Jenkins, *Public Higher Education in South Carolina – A Survey Report* by Peabody College, as well as reprints of articles about MCSC's growth published in national journals. The series is arranged alphabetically by publication type.
